Bend Parkway Speed Detail



Bend Police conducted a traffic safety detail on the Bend Parkway between June 7 and June 20. Over the 14-day speed detail, officers made a total of 290 stops. Of those stops, 259 citations were given, 250 for speeding, eight for driving while suspended and one other citation. A total of 68 warnings were issued. In addition, one person was arrested for an active warrant. Drivers were cited for speeds ranging from 58 MPH to 84 MPH (39 MPH over the speed limit).
