

Context

Temporary Safe Stay Area (TSSA) and Safe Parking

Developed in consideration of:

- CHRO's RFQ process
- Concerns of the community
- Current services and capacity of our partners
- American Rescue Act Plan (ARPA) requirements

Proposed Code Changes



Summary of rationale for amendments

- Address communication and consistency challenges for City staff in applying and explaining time regulations for tent camping and vehicle camping when impacts on surrounding areas tend to be similar
- Ongoing complaints related to camping in vehicles not being effectively addressed, including near residential dwellings
- 2022 code did not specifically define vehicle camping or vehicle sheltering, as other cities have done; staff believe greater clarification will be helpful in Bend
- Multiple complaints from residents and businesses about vehicle camping related to concerns about environmental conditions, sanitation, safety, and adverse impacts



Summary of proposed code amendments

24 hours in one location before moving, for both tents and vehicles (72 hour notice required before removing established camp)

New movement requirement of 1,500 feet for vehicles


Density limit of three camps per block applies to any combination of vehicles and tents

No camping of any kind on same block face as a residential dwelling

Adopt definition of vehicle camping




1,500 Foot Movement Requirement






1,500 Foot Movement Requirement

Vehicle camping definition

Observations and/or evidence of or related to any combination of the following may be indicia that a vehicle is being used to camp or for camping: litter, rubbish, or waste in, on, or near a vehicle; activities of daily living such as eating, sleeping, bathing, preparing or cooking meals; items that are not generally associated with basic vehicle maintenance such as bedding, kitchen items, cookware, food, food or water containers, personal grooming items, camp materials, items used as furniture, etc.; urination or defecation near a vehicle; obscuring of some or all of a vehicle's windows; and other indications that a vehicle is being used for more than transportation.



What isn't vehicle camping?

If a vehicle is otherwise legally parked, the vehicle will not necessarily be considered a camp or used for camping if it is being used for temporary alleviation of sickness, a temporary medical emergency or a temporary physical inability to operate the vehicle, or for similar reasons, simply because someone is occupying the vehicle or asleep in the vehicle, provided there are no violations of the time, place and manner regulations in this Chapter.



What won't change?

- 72 hour notice required prior to removal
- Potential need to consider modification under ADA Title II (usually, more time)
- Don't tow vehicles while they are occupied
- Coordination with multiple contractors and appropriate City resources for the particular situation
- Storage obligation and retrieval opportunity
