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



Drug Overdose Mortality Rates from a Perspective of National to Oregon to Deschutes

- In the past four years, 2020-2023, Oregon experienced large changes in drug overdose mortality rates
- Oregon moved from one of the lowest States in the nation to one of the highest
- Last year in 2023, Oregon saw its largest single-yearincrease, resulting in rates substantially higher than the National rate
- While Deschutes County has some of the lowest rates in Oregon, we have seen increases here too




Drug Overdose Mortality Rates Spiking in Oregon Four Consecutive Years – 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023

From 34 in 2022 to 45 in 2023










In Four Years, Oregon's Drug Overdose Mortality Rates Moved From the Bottom Quartile of the United States to the Top Quartile





Drug Overdose Mortality Rates Per 100,000 Population by State in 2023














Large Differences in Drug Trends Between Oregon and United States Toxicology Test Results of Drug Overdose Deaths in Past Six years



There is some good news...

Emergency Department visits for opioid overdoses peaked in Oregon in August 2023. They have declined somewhat since that time, indicating that the steep rise in Oregon's 2023 drug overdose deaths is unlikely to continue in 2024.

Similarly, ED visits for opioid overdoses in <u>Central</u> <u>Oregon</u> also peaked in the 3rd quarter of 2023 and have declined somewhat since that time.






Opioid Overdose Emergency Department Visits in Oregon Have Peaked and Started to Decline January 2020 – July 2024


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
Drug Overdose Deaths Decreased in The Last Four Months of 2023 in the United States



Methamphetamine & Stimulant-Related Emergency Department Visits in Oregon Remain Unchanged January 2020 – July 2024










Verification that Deschutes County Drug Proportions Look Very Similar to Oregon Over the Past Three Years Combined 2021-2023

- 1. Interrupt the Drug Supply Law enforcement agencies
 - Federal
 - State
 - Local

2. Interrupt the Drug Demand

Prevention, treatment, recovery programs and services

- Public Health
- Behavioral / Mental Health
- Healthcare Providers



Summary

- Deschutes County saw moderate increases in drug overdose deaths in the past four years, when many other Oregon communities experienced much larger changes and increases
- Five Oregon counties in 2023 had drug overdose mortality rates above 50 per 100,000 population; placing them in the top 5% of counties in the United States
- Oregon Emergency Department data, however, show a meaningful change in opioid overdose trends decreasing in 2024
- If this trend continues, it is unlikely Oregon will experience a fifth consecutive year of spiking drug overdose deaths in 2024
